In November, Sharnae Harmon, former Pathways to Success student from Sussex Tech High School Class of 2020, visited the school and presented her story to students currently enrolled in the Pathways to Success program. It is incredible what she has been able to accomplish in her first few years after graduating from high school.

Sharnae received a congressional and vice president nomination to attend the United States Military Academy at West Point. Since being there, she became a systems engineering major with a focus on industrial engineering.

She has been a member of the Army Boxing team and has gone on to win 2 national championships. She has also won numerous scholarly awards for GPA (Dean's awards) and attended military schools (Air Assault).

"There were days I did not think I would make it. However, Pathways was there to give me the support, guidance, and academic tutoring I needed. I graduated high school with excellent grades and am now a Senior Cadet at West Point. I believe I am the first African American woman from Sussex County to be admitted into this prestigious military college."

Sharnae wants to share the message that, no matter what, black women can overcome adversity and succeed.

Kris and Dan, after being together for 40 years, have 4 children between them and 6 grandchildren and are expecting their third great grandchild in April 2024.



Call It What It Is... Do You Know What You Feel?

Feelings are our thoughts about the emotions we experience, and can sometimes be distorted or inaccurate.

Feelings are mental interpretations initiated after our mind recognizes a shift in our associated emotional state.

Emotions are physical and instinctive reactions to events. They result from external stimuli and are sensations caused by the release of chemicals from the brain.

Common emotional triggers include an event, person, place, object, memory, or anything that stimulates the five senses.

"Most communication problems stem from communicating only part of the truth, not the complete truth. The other part is 'selective hearing' or hearing what you want to hear.

Our 5 Levels of Feelings

- 1.) Anger, blame, and resentment
- 2.) Hurt, sadness and disappointment
- 3.) Fear and insecurity
- 4.) Remorse, regret, and responsibility
- 5.) Love, intention, understanding, and forgiveness

When we fail to resolve underlying conflict at Level 1, then Levels 2, 3, and 4 act as defense mechanisms. These interfere with our ability to feel loved or be loving towards others.

Unprocessed Emotions can lead to:

- 1.) Over-thinking
- 2.) Projecting onto others
- 3.) Reacting instead of responding
- 4.) Being critical vs. showing compassion
- 5.) Being distracted vs. being focused
- 6.) Being over-analytical

When we don't process our negative painful emotions, we become depleted, ineffective, and isolated. It becomes difficult to see past our differences or our own biases and agendas.

However, basic human nature is to love and be loved. It is our differences that make us unique and beautiful. When we heal ourselves and operate from Level 5 of our feelings, we find peace.

So far this fall, we have spent time helping the students get to know each other. We have used icebreakers and introductory games that encourage sharing. We have begun taking a hard look at the topic of friendship and uncovering what we expect and want out of a friend. We introduced the students to family genograms and taught them how to create self-affirmations. We are working to increase self-awareness by looking at the inner critic and inner champion. The evidence-based curriculum provided by the One Circle Foundation greatly benefits the young ladies in this program.

Powering the Workforce Utility Training Program

This fall, five Pathways students resumed coursework for a special program titled "Powering the Workforce Utility Training", which began last spring. The partnership between Pathways To Success and Delmarva Power targets students from groups underrepresented in the company's demographics, one of which is females.

The main goal of the training is to provide instruction that will prepare candidates for employment aptitude testing. Upon completion of the coursework and reaching age 18, students have the opportunity to take the CAST (Construction and Skilled Trades) Test. Any candidate who passes the CAST Test immediately becomes eligible for employment with Delmarva Power. This is a wonderful career opportunity for our students!
